
MARY HARRINGTON BAILEY: EARLY SETTLER

THE DESCENDANTS OF HER SON:

JOHN KENDALL THISTLEWOOD

John Kendall Thistlewood was born on February 17, 1841 in Alexander, Maine. He was the fifth child of record of Mary Harrington Bailey and the only child born after her marriage to Robert Thistlewood on January 21, 1841.







EMILY (DORSETT) THISTLEWOOD

John seems to have been a man of several occupations during his lifetime. The 1873 Maine Registrar, and several years thereafter lists him as a manufacturer of carriages. The 1880 census of Alexander has him as a farmer, and his death certificate lists him as a carpenter.

John was active in civic affairs. The Maine Registrar lists John as a member of the Board of Selectmen in 1873, a member of the School Board in 1876, and an Assessor during several years between 1875 and 1883.

A deed recorded in the Washington County Registry, dated November 17, 1892 and recorded in Book 204, page 516 tells us that he bought lot #2 from Austin and Emily F. Harris on June 4, 1879. He purchased lots #3 and #4 from the Trustees of the Ministeral and School Fund on December 30, 1891, and lot #40 from the Bingham Heirs (with no date listed). These lots are all located at the north end of the Lyons (or Thistlewood) Road. The same deed tells us that he sold all the above lots to the Brown Brothers, Horace, Abner, and Charles L. This property is now part of Georgia-Pacific holdings. All that remains to tell us that this was once a farm is a cellar hole and stone walls.

John married first his cousin Eunice S. Strout on June 21, 1863. She was a daughter of Soloman and Lydia (Bailey) Strout. She was born in Alexander on January 6, 1845.

Children of John K. and Eunice (Strout) Thistlewood of record:

- 1. Lowell was born on December 28, 1867 and died 18 days later on January 15, 1868. He is buried in a marked grave in the Thistlewood family lot in the Alexander Cemetery.
- 2. Mary S. was listed as one year old on the 1870 Census of Alexander. NOTE: Gertrude (Strout) Winter in the Strout Family Records she compiled indicates there may have been two more children. If this is the case, they probably died young as they do not appear on the 1880 Census.

Eunice (Strout) Thistlewood died on March 1, 1875 at Alexander. She is probably buried in the Thistlewood lot at the Alexander Cemetery.

John Kendall Thistlewood next was married to Eunice's cousin, Emily F. Dorsett, by Reverend S. M. Dunton at Alexander on April 7, 1876. Emily was the daughter of Slyvanus B. and Patience (Strout) Dorsett and was born at Steep Falls, Maine on April 26, 1842.

Children of John K and Emily (Dorsett) Thistlewood of record: All born in Alexander.

- Albert Ray was born on November 30, 1877. He married Vina Rodgers and they had two children. Ray died at Byfield, Massachusetts on January 6, 1950 and is buried at Haverhill MA. Vina died in 1976 at Byfield. Their children and grandchildren:
 - A. John whose children were John, Peter, Ronald, Albert Ray, and Donna who married a a man named Stefanile.
 - B. Arnold whose children were Roger, Daniel, and Arnold.
- 2. Lizzie married Harry Peckett. Lizzie died in 1920. Their children, Roland and Blanche both died without issue:

note: The 1880 Alexander Census lists Albert as age 3 and Lizzie as age 1.

- 3. Mabel was born on July 18, 1880. She married William Steele (1877-1945). Mabel died on February 17, 1950 at Byfield, Mass. They had two children, twins. One died at birth, the other:
 - A. Eleanor, married Albert Walker in 1937 and was living in 1981 at Byfield, Mass.
- 4. Nellie is believed to have been married, and widowed. No children are listed in our records. She died prior to 1950.

On the 1870 Alexander Census, John, Eunice, Lowell, and Mary were living with John's parents. On the 1880 Alexander Census, John and Emily were listed with Lizzie and Albert. John's mother Mary was living with them. The 1861 Walling Map of Washington County has R. K. Thistlewood at the home site at the north end of the Lyons Road. Colby's 1881 Atlas has J. K. Thistlewood at this site. John and Emily sold their home in Alexander in 1891 and likely that same year moved to Byfield, Mass.

Emily died on April 7, 1910 at Byfield. John died there on March or May 26, 1911. Both are buried in the Byfield Cemetery, Georgetown, Mass.

Henry Pulke served 11 years with the King's Orange Regiment and was given a land grant in 1784 at Quaco Bay, St. John County, N.B. That land was later regranted in new divisions to other people. Henry, and his sons John and Matthew were granted land at St. David in 1826.

Five of Henry's sons and their families are listed in the St. David 1851 Census. The Maine Census for towns near Calais have generous lists bearing the name Polk from 1850 to 1900.

CHURCH OF THE OPEN BIBLE

In June, 1976 a group of Alexander people met at Elbridge McArthur's on the Cooper Road to discuss their need for a church in the Town of Alexander. Some of those present included Tom and Sandra Smith, Bernard and Barbara Flood, Elbridge and Barbara McArthur, Lawrence and Hilda Lord, Glenn and Grita Carson, Ernie and Betty Hugli, Wilson and Frances Finch, Ruth Dwelley, and Barbara and Richard Fowler. At that meeting plans were made for the establishment of a new church and Richard Fowler was called to be their Pastor and Sandra Smith was elected as Treasurer.



On June 26, 1976 the church met for their services at the Alexander Grange Hall and had prayer meetings on Wednesday night in individual homes. As the church grew, plans were drawn up and work started on the building shown on this page. Most materials and labor were donated by Church members; however, many gifts came from folks in other areas. The first baptism was at Pleasant Lake in August, 1976. It wasn't until late fall that the first service was held in the basement of the new building.

The Downeast Christian School was opened by the Church in the fall of 1977 and was the first Christian School in Washington County. The school has had many volunteers and among its teaching staff over the years we find: Tammy Winship, Deborah Doten, Joan Dodge, Donna Heathcote, Barbara Fowler, Robert Johnson, Rocky Young, Sally Ketchen, Mavis Synder, David Wilson, Judy Howell, Kathy Kesel, and Frank Keisler. Other helpers were Norma Wallace, Deborah Aiguier, Barbara McArthur, Yvonne Hunt, Viola Dwelley, and Vere Hunt.

In February 1989, Richard Fowler left the Church and went to Shag Harbor, Nova Scotia. During the next 12 months, several people provided leadership for the Church. In February 1990 Edmund D. "Chip" Howell, Jr. became pastor of the Church of the Open Bible.

SOUTH PRINCETON: THE WOODLAND ROAD NEIGHBORHOOD by Mary Wallace

This second article about South Princeton is about the area east of the Four Corners, the road toward Woodland, and the two short roads that intersect with it. Bruce Belmore's <u>Early Princeton, Maine</u>, Colby's 1881 Washington County Atlas, and Walling's 1861 Map of Washington County were the paper resources used. Additions and corrections are always welcome.

People who gave information on this neighborhood were Eleanor and Vernon Wentworth, Ruth and Ernest McLellan, Donald McLellan, Vivian and Ernest Scott, Aggie Bryant, Gloria and John Argraves, Craig Roderick, Pamela Leighton, Hilda Edgerly, and Wayne Leighton.

This is the site of <u>Peter Carle's Hotel</u> which was built between 1834 and 1835 on the 122 acre lot. The occupant in 1861 is listed as <u>J. Craft</u> and in 1881 as <u>P. Smart</u>. On May 16, 1903, Charles McLellan bought the property from John W. Hatfield, who may have resided here. <u>Charles and Cora McLellan</u> and 6 of their children moved here from Princeton. Their last 9 children were born here. <u>Katie Crafts</u> (1899-1918) kept house for Cora until Katie died of the flu. <u>Emma Smith</u>, sister of Tracy, lived with Cora and is buried in the paupers lot at South Princeton Cemetery. Avard McLellan inherited the house from Cora but did not live here as an adult.

In 1956, brothers Donald and Ernest McLellan built the present house. Ernest and Ruth McLellan lived here from 1956 to 1964. The house was rented for a number of years. The first tenants were Oliver and Irene Lockhart. Other renters were Roger Young, Stevie Neale (son of Ernestine and Kenneth), Princeton town manager Ronnie Belanger, Navy recruiter Ronald MacDonald, and a Hartman family. Jeff McLellan, son of Ernest and Ruth lived here for 6 or 7 months. The last tenant was Judy Perkin's daughter. The house was empty in 1989 until late 1991 when Ernest and Ruth McLellan moved back. They have added a large garage in the summer of 1992 and renovated the house.

- Riney and Donald McLellan had a camper here from 1937 till 1939. Don's mother, Cora, had fallen down cellar and broken her collar bone, then was in a car accident and suffered a broken shoulder. Don's wife, Riney took care of Cora. Don had a tar paper shack on the back of a truck which he used as a home while traveling from job to job. This was the camper that they set up to live in while Cora was laid up.
- 3 A trailer home was moved here for Vernon Wentworth"s aunt, Thelma Ingraham. Darryl Wentworth bought it from his aunt in 1979 and lived here until 1983. The trailer was then rented to Jeff and Laurie Diadone ('83-'86), Shelley and John Baianco ('86-'87), constructions workers for 6 months in 87 when new boiler was built, and Jan and Mike Corbin ('88-'89). Darryl Wentworth moved back in 1989 and is working on his new house which will be noted in issue 76.

- "Don and Marshall McLellan sawed out lumber on a sawing machine and built this house" according to Don. That was about 1934. It was home to Marshall and Lila (Hunnewell) McLellan until 1945. The land (2 acres) had been conveyed to Marshall by his mother on May 27, 1941. From 1945 to 1957 it was rented to various tenants. Ernest and Ruth McLellan lived here from their marriage in 1954 to 1956 when they moved into their new home (site 1). Robert and Thelma Hunnewell were renters for 2 years before they moved to Meddybemps. It has been the home of Vernon and Eleanor (McLellan) Wentworth since April 1959.
- 5 <u>Byron McLellan</u> lived here from 1933 to 1935 in a house he "built on rocks". It was moved to site 17 using two trucks pulling and one truck pushing it down the road.
- 6 Marshall and Lila McLellan built this house for their daughter, Winifred (McLellan) Carter after her divorce in the mid 1960's. Later Winifred remarried and moved to Hancock County with her second husband. Marshall and Lila moved from site 7 and spent their last years in this house. Winifred came home after Marshall died to care for Lila. She has lived here since.

- In 1881 this was the home site for <u>H. (Hiram) H. and Fannie Billings</u>. He was a Civil War veteran. James S. McCrea held a mortgage on this property from April 1922 until April 1926 when Stephen Billings, son of Hiram and Fannie, sold to <u>Maxwell and Belle McLellan</u>. In 1945 the house was sold to <u>Marshall and Lila (Hunnewell) McLellan</u>. This house was pulled down and burned on December 14, 1987 by Vernon Wentworth. In 1990, a double wide mobile home was moved onto this site by <u>Donna (Wentworth) and Jason Worden</u> which is their home.
- 8 This house was built by Arthur Dwelley in 1975 or 1977. Rachelle Brown lived here but it belonged to her sister. James Dumont, a school teacher lived here a year or two. In 1980 it became home to Billy and Heidi Seavey. They run a snow sled repair business from their home. It is believed the first school house was here, half way between E. Rolfe and the Four Corners.

The next two places are on the Billings Road, the first in Princeton and the second in Alexander.

9 John Hunter and John Robinson were listed as residents of Bonney in 1832 and were owners of this lot in 1834. John Robinson was 1st assessor of #17 (as Princeton was named before incorporation) in 1831, and his brother, Presden, also lived in Bonney in 1832. It is assumed that they resided on this lot and likely at this site which is on a hill. W. (William) and Sarah Callaghan lived here in 1861 and 1881.

Don McLellan's Uncle Frank Noddin lived here as a boy. Frank was the son of <u>Isaac and Mary Etta (Frost) Noddin</u>. They pried out rocks using a grey birch spud, to make the fields suitable for plowing. Frank courted and married Gertrude McLellan, daughter of Jacob. They had three children, Harold, Dorothy, and Lauren.

The land passed to Jacob Bailey, then to David Dresser in 1903, and 1908 Harry Edgerly (Hilda's father) purchased this farm. Harry never lived here, in fact Hilda is doubtful that there was a house here at that time. Ivan, Harry's son inherited the land in 1970 and sold all but 2 acres to GP in the mid 1970's. Byron McLellan helped Harry Edgerly cut wood here.

10 In 1861 this was home to <u>S Billings</u>. <u>F. (Freeman) and Fannie Billings</u> were the residents in 1881.

11 William Colwell had 100 acres in 1834. He is listed in 1861 and 1881 at this site. Likely this was William, Jr. who lived from 1809 to 1887. His father died in 1851 at age 89 and may have lived here.

Isaac "Ike" and Clara Colwell moved here from Alexander. After the house burned down, he sold the lot to John and Cynthia Seamans who built another house. Clarence Eldon and Mona (McLellan) Seamans inherited the place and sold it to Robert and Blanche (Bushey) Doten. The Dotens in turn sold the property to Raymond Jewel in the late 1950's. Ray Jewel resided here for a short time and rented it to Rev. Herbert Samuel Reed. Reed preached at the Church at the Four Corners. Reed also rented Shirley Archibald's camp on the Lake Road, and at time stayed in the cellar of the Church.

Jewel sold the 10 acre farmhouse lot to <u>Richard and Jean Whelan</u> who lived here until this house burned. This 10 acres was acquired by <u>Ernest and Vivian (Cox) Scott</u> in 1979 who built their home west of the original building site. They call their place "Agony Acres". Mark Jewel, son of Raymond, apparently still owns the other 70 acres.

(12) Wayne Leighton built this house in 1986.


Children of Charles and Cora McLellan who resided at site 1: Annie, Millicent, Vern, Albert, Inez, Maxwell, Venetia, Marshall, Robert, Byron, Beryl, Charles (called Ted), Donald, Delwin, and Avard.

The next three places are located on the Smith Road.

- (13) A cellar hole which may have been the site of a <u>Turner</u> family who were related to Tracy Smith. Was this the home of <u>J. A. Colwell</u> in 1881?
- (14) A cellar hole and well mark the home site of Tracy Smith.
- 15 John and Pam Leighton moved a trailer here on July 4, 1979. A well and septic system were already in place. Was this the site of <u>F.</u> Sprague in 1881?

TRAGIC ACCIDENT

In August 1924, a tragic accident happened near the Smith Road. Verna (James) Taylor, wife of Freddie Taylor, had returned from Alexander where she had attended the funeral for Marcia (Flood) Cousins. Verna then went to pick berries and was accidentally shot to death.



- 16 In 1971 Byron and Agnes Ellsworth moved here from Woodland and set up a trailer.
- 17 Three houses on this site burned before Don McLellan purchased the house "built on rocks" for \$100 from his brother, Byron, and moved it from site 5.

This was the E. (Ebenezer) Rolfe place at the top of Rolfe Hill. It was built in 1834 as the home for <u>Ebenezer (1786-1859)</u> and <u>Nancy (1791-1862)</u> Rolfe. The Rolfe's had 5 sons, one, Putnam (1811-1878), moved to Princeton in 1834. In 1832 he served as 3rd assessor, and served for many years as 1st selectman. Asa (1819-1874) and Charles were two other sons. The 1861 Map indicates that <u>A. Bonney</u> lived here, and in 1881 it was home to <u>E. Sprague</u>.

Site (17) continued:

Rolfe McNabe had a truck farm garden here. He later moved to Mt. View area, first to the south side, then to the north side. He shot himself.

<u>Ike Colwell</u> moved here from site 13 and built a house just behind where the present house is located. He lived here a year or so and it burned.

In 1939, <u>Donald and Riney (Buzzell) McLellan</u> moved a house to this site (see #2), "tore it down flat", and built their present home from the lumber. They lived in the tar paper shack (see site 2) which they had unloaded from the truck and placed on this lot while the house was being constructed.

- 18 Craig and Lynn (Prout) Roderick built this in 1977 and it has been their home since.
- 19 John and Gloria (Fitch) Argraves purchased 3 parcels of land and built their home here in 1975. During the summer of 1992 a large building was built next to their house. This contains a year around swimming pool.
- The history of occupation of this lot is confusing. Apparently the lot was owned by a Rolfe followed by P. Sprague in 1861 and 1881. Frank deFranko built the house in the 1930's and was a long time resident. Next occupants were Norris and "Toots" Kneeland, followed by tenants Wayne and Wendy (Hinson) Leighton. In 1985 or 1986, the house was purchased by Les and Agnes Bryant. The road to this house forks and one branch goes around the hill connecting to the South Princeton Road at the foot of Hannah Hill (Asa Sprague place).

The South Princeton Cemetery is located on the north side of the road, but the 1881 Atlas shows it on the south side! A list of grave stone inscriptions for this cemetery is printed in this newsletter. At one time a fairly decent road ran from here to Anderson Hill. on the Houlton Road.

THE STORY OF THREE HOUSES

The GODFREY house on the Arm Road was burned by the Alexander Fire Department for its owner, Foster Carlow, Jr. The house was in terrible shape and a danger to anyone going inside. Ray Bohanon was one of the last to live here.

The CLINTIN FLOOD house on the Blacks Road had the upstairs and roof destroyed by fire on August 16, 1992. Current owner, Leo Dumont of Massachusetts, was at the house at the time of the fire.

The MANLEY BOHANON house on the South Princeton Road recently became tax acquired property of the Town of Alexander. The house lost the chimney and is in poor condition.

SOUTH PRINCETON CEMETERY

This list of gravestone inscriptions is based on a work done in 1970 and noted "Copied from Markers, Sarah Allan Moffett". The Town of Princeton had this cemetery surveyed in July 1992. This survey lists every stone and includes a map so stones can easily be found. A-CHS has a copy of both lists. The recent survey does not always keep family units together, so I have chosen to combine the 1970 list with the 1992 list. I then compared this revised list with Hilda Edgerly's notebook on this cemetery. In several cases I checked stones where the lists did not agree. jhd

Nancy sent a photocopy of an 1863 deed which conveyed a plot of land to the Inhabitants of Alexander for use as a cemetery. This deed was from her great great grandparents Solomon and Lydia (Bailey) Strout. This plot of land is described as being part of lot # 66, " a part of the homestead of said Solomon Strout". Lot # 66 is located south of Route Nine and east of the Old Cooper Road. The cemetery site itself is south of a road from the Old Cooper Road to the cellar where Solomon's house once stood. The site was apparently used for a few years, but was eventually abandoned. Some, maybe all bodies were moved to the Alexander Cemetery. The reason for its abandonment is not known; perhaps it was the stony ground compared to the "sand hill", or the small size (one-half acre), or maybe the town's failure to build a cedar pole fence on three sides and "a substantial picket fence to be of good materials and done in a workmanlike manner" on the other side. Today all we find at the site are a line of depressions in a blueberry field.

Thank you Nancy for this interesting part of Alexander history.
