the Lydick Set Off Prepared by John M. Dudley

Prior to April 2,1859 the town line between Alexander and Crawford was straight, and ran North and South. After that date this line had a jag in it, being "The Lydick Set Off". The 1861 map does not show this Set Off, but the 1881 map includes it.

One Godfrey Lydick in 1858 occupied a farm in Alexander on the Arm Road. His farm was bounded on the West by the Town of Crawford. Lydick apparently preferred to live in Crawford. His method to accomplish this was not to move to Crawford, but to have his farm set off from Alexander and annexed to Crawford.

In 1858 he filed his Petition in the State Legislature. Following is the order that was issued:

"STATE OF MAINE: The Joint Standing Committee on Division of Towns to which was referred the Petition of Godfrey Lydick praying that he may be set off from the Town of Alexander and annexed to the Town of Crawford has had the same under consideration, and asks leave to report that the Petitioner cause an attested copy of this Petition with this order thereon, to be served on the town clerks of the Town of Alexander and Crawford eight days at least, before the 5th day of March next that all persons interested, may then appear and show cause, (if any they have) why the prayer of said Petition should not be granted." S/ W.J. Sargent Pr. Order

The above was "Read and accepted in the Senate on Feb.18, 1858 and in the House of Representatives on Feb.19, 1858. A Remonstrance against the Petition was signed by 49 residents of Alexander and duly filed. This Remonstrance reads as follows:

"The undersigned citizens of Alexander in the County of Washington would respectfully, yet firmly, remonstrate against the Petition of Godfrey Lydick to be set off from this town, to Crawford - being granted - Mr. Lydick, enjoys all the privilages now in relation to Schools that he would enjoy, if he should be set off to Crawford - he draws his proportion of the school money, annually, & expends the same in Crawford - and as Mr. Lydick does not own the land on which he lives it is doubtful if the Proprietors would consent to such a transfer - therefore for the above, and other reasons, we pray that Lydick's petition may not be granted - and as in duty bound your petitions will ever pray."

"CHAPTER 343 - An act to set off a part of the town of Alexander and annex the same to Crawford. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows: All that part of the town of Alexander constituting the farm now owned and occupied by Godfrey Lydick is hereby set off from Alexander and annexed to Crawford; but said land is subject to all arrears of taxes heretofore assessed upon it by the town of Alexander. Approved April 2, 1859."

In the Remonstrance by the citizens of Alexander we find a reference to "schools". The 1861 map shows a school in Crawford at the corner of the Arm Road and the Air Line. This same map shows schools in Alexander, one located at Strout's corner, and another one up on the Breakneck Road. It would appear that Mr. Lydick thought that the school in Crawford was more convenient for his children to attend.

The 1881 map shows J. Lydick on this lot. The present owner is thought to be our society's Crawford historian, Ethel Pearl Wallace.
