Our town clerk, Tina Smith, was telling me where records involve the birth, marriage intentions and census from about 1896 which are made available on micro film to researchers at the Maine State Archives; and that 'registered' marriage, death and birth information, from 1900 to the present, can be obtained from the Maine State Registra, Vital Statistics Dept. of Human Services, State House, Augusta, Me. 04333. Whenever you require a birth certificate prior to 1975, please contact Tina. The cost is \$2.00 regardless of whether you send direct, or receive the certified copy from her. If Tina sends for your birth certificate she will receive a free copy for our town files, and make out a 'registered' copy from it for you. (Her telephone number is 202-454-3420).

REPORT FROM THE BUILDING COMMITTEE, by John M. Dudley, chairman

The first prospect was the old schoolhouse at Strout's Corner in Alexander. This building, and the land it is located on, was offered to

the society free of charge by Dr. Jack Murtaugh.

About six members of the society went to the property to examine it. The building had undergone numerous changes since it was used as a school house. The foundation had deteriorated up to four feet above ground level, including floor timbers, sills, etc. It was determined that the cost of raising and rebuilding just this part would be in excess of \$5,000.

This was in the infancy of the A-CHS. We had no funds and did not know

what the future of the society might be. We appreciated the offer but

were in no position to accept it.

The second prospect was the 'Gospel Assembly' building located on the old Will Strout property at Strout's corner, then owned by Ed and Kaye McNulty. This building, though not too old, was offered to us at a very reasonable price. It was in good condition.

However, the land was not for sale. This meant we would have to move it. Before we could move the building we had to own a lot of land on which to place it. We did not have the funds to purchase it, the funds to pay for

moving, or to buy the land. Therefore, nothing was done.
Our society is less than two years old, and our membership has reached over 200. However, we cannot commit ourselves to a headquarters until we are financial solvent, and in a position to maintain such a building. When that time arrives we will become incorporated under the laws of The State of Maine.

We will continue to look for a suitable building and land within our

financial means. When such time arrives, we will act.


